field efforts are put into searching from the coastline to the open sea, new records of marine mammals continue to arise from various parts of South America! This is the case with Ziphius for Mexico (Cárdenas-Hinojosa et al.), Feresa for Trinidad and Tobago (Naranjit et al.), Pseudorca for Argentina (Bustos et al.) and several cetacean species for Suriname (De Boer). Foraging is the underlying subject of two notes, dealing with strand-feeding by dolphins in Ecuador (Jiménez and Alava) and sea lions and killer whales interacting with fisheries in Argentina (Seco Pon et al.). The role of disease is ever more present in aquatic mammal research: Van Bressem et al. review several skin conditions in cetaceans in South America, and Delgado et al. report Leptospira titers in freshwater manatees in Peru. Finally, manatee capture techniques and tracking are the focus of a note by González-Socoloske et al. Schiavini signs the piece on Natalie Goodall's life and scientific achievements.

We are able to bring this issue to completion thanks to a concerted effort by a group of members of our Editorial Board. In addition to their regular editorial responsibilities on assigned manuscripts, Maritza Sepúlveda, Federico Riet, Fernando Félix and Miriam Marmontel helped with additional tasks in the production of all manuscripts. Finally, we would be remiss if we didn't recognize the unwavering support of Yaqu Pacha, which has funded the production of this issue.
